

The following history of The First Cabal can be gleaned from EIECET's diary:

During the resurgence of interest in philosophy and science in the latter part of the 17th century, thinkers and authors such as [Baruch Spinoza](#) formulated the first ideas of a natural god. The first cabal, made up of such figures as Christopher Wren, Isaac Newton, Nicholas Hawksmoor and Nystor Ferencz, drew on early traditions of naturalistic deities in pagan religions, such as Cernunnos, the Green Man, and especially the Hellenic god Pan, and merged them with Spinoza's philosophies to develop an 'enlightened, scientific god'.

Hawksmoor, apprenticed to Wren, designed a number of churches in London. Several, like Christchurch, were in the East End. The cabal began formulating plans for a *Panspermia*, a child born of Pan, and the churches Hawksmoor was building were to be instrumental to the plan. The motivations behind this were visions by several of Europe's mystics and seers of dark days to follow, during the 20th century.

This child was to be instrumental in humanity's surviving the dark times. Although the other members of the cabal grew old and died, Nystor Ferencz pursued magickal means to further his life, so that he might see the project through to fruition.
